IN REMEMBRANCE

Caucus Remembers Mary Blocher Smeltzer

My name is Mary Kay Ogden. I have been inspired and influenced by Mary Blocher Smeltzer for over fifty years.

As a twelve year old in Elgin, Illinois, I learned to know Mary and her family as members of the Highland Avenue Church of the Brethren and to be impressed with Mary as a social activist. She invited my father (and I accompanied him) to a meeting about low income housing. It was quickly apparent that this wife, mother, and teacher made time to work on behalf of the poor and marginalized.



As a high school student, I served on the church youth cabinet, and it was Mary who took on the responsibility for advising that high school youth group and often leading the Sunday School class. Her forthright questions, during the civil rights movement, such as "Do you know or have any black friends?" caused us to think and get right to the heart of issues.

As a sophomore at La Verne College, I was awarded the Janet Smeltzer scholarship. Not only was it a help financially, it was a testament to the foresight Ralph and Mary had in honoring the life of their young daughter, by providing assistance to young women seeking a college education, when their own daughter's life had been cut short so tragically.

It is the establishment of Womaen's Caucus that earned Mary the respect, and admiration of women and men across the denomination. Not that she was interested in being admired. She was interested in fairness, justice, and equality for every human being, regardless.

In 1971, A group of thirteen women, including Dorothy Davis, Patricia Smeltzer, and Marty Smeltzer West wrote the following and sent it as an invitation and rationale to participate across the denomination in a women's caucus saying: "A women's caucus can be a transformational force within the life of each woman, in the experiences of the Church of the Brethren, and in the fabric of society." This was followed up by an all-day meeting at the St. Petersburg, Florida Annual Conference in 1971. Interest in women's issues continued to grow as the General Board adopted the "Equality for Women" paper in March of 1972. In May of 1972 Mary Cline Detrick and Mary Blocher Smeltzer took on the assignment as coordinators of the movement toward a caucus. At the Fresno, California Annual Conference in 1973, a group of 50 people voted to formally establish a Women's Caucus. It continues today as a voice for equity. I currently serve with Daisy Schmidt and Sara Davis on the Womaen's Caucus Steering Committee. *

It was refreshing to spend time with her because she was so transparent. Just thinking about Mary makes me smile, and reminds me to continue working for justice and equity.

Rainbow Handcrafts

In late 2008, members of the Church of the Brethren began knitting and crocheting rainbow yarn scarves and handcrafts in support of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (lgbt) people in the Church and world. Since the 2009 Annual Conference in San Diego, we have given away over 1000 rainbow handcrafts and the project has taken root and grown far beyond what we ever dreamed it might.

This powerful witness of love, support, and conscience has been embraced by people of all ages and made a fundamental difference in how many people, especially lgbt Christians and those who love them, experience Conference and the Church. It has also raised questions about why we wear rainbow scarves and whether they are divisive or counter to Annual Conference statements and decisions.

We wear rainbow scarves:

- ◆ To support and create safe spaces for LGBT persons in the church
- ◆ To save lives
- As an act of Christian unity, not divisiveness
- As a witness and confession
- For reasons as individual as we are!
