We are proud to announce that the Mother of Caucus honoree for 2014 was Zandra Wagoner. She is the Interfaith Chaplain at the University of La Verne. She is an ordained minister in the Church of the Brethren and holds a Ph.D in Religious Studies. As Chaplain, she directs the multi-religious Office of Religious and Spiritual Life, and teaches for the Philosophy and Religion Department, including introductory

courses in religion and specialized courses in the areas of gender/sexuality, contemporary theology, interfaith cooperation, and the environment/animals in the study of religion. Denominationally, Zandra worked with Womaen's Caucus as the Caucus Administrator for 8 years, served on the BMC Board, and was the chaplain at McPherson College. Currently, she is actively involved in interfaith efforts locally and nationally. She shares her life with her partner of 14 years, and for fun, participates in dog agility sports with their two canine companions, an exercise in cross-species communication.

Annual Conference Report

The meeting in Columbus brought many new things for the Progressives, as you may have heard. While it was business as usual the four groups decided to work together and create a space for ourselves at in the exhibit hall.



We each offered talks throughout the conference at a central booth space.

Much of the vision of this space was designed by Kay Guyer, the former Kaleidoscope volunteer for BMC. Womaen's Caucus offered talks on inclusive language, women and second calls, and vision. All of the talks were powerful, some moved us to tears, it was a space in which we were actively building community and continuing conversations that had long been silenced.

Caucus also began taking statistics, which will be compiled and put on the website, of how who talked at the microphone. Some of this will come out in our next issue of Femailings. This has lead to a bigger interest in ordination statistics and is something we will continue to work on. One of the most powerful things we did at conference was to have a prayer vigil for the women on the ballot

before the voting. We will continue to do this practice in the coming years. Our luncheon and silent auction was an overwhelming success and we, with your help, raised \$1,536.00.

Progressive Gathering 2014 Report

The 2014 Progressive Brethren Gathering was held Nov. 7-9. We were warmly welcomed and treated to gracious hospitality by our host Church, Stone Church of the Brethren, Huntingdon, PA, pastors, Chris and Dale Dowdy. Approximately 65 persons preregistered, and additional folks registered during the event. Members of Stone Church as well as participants from the Juniata College community increased our gathering to well over 100 attendees.

Rev. Linda Mercadante, keynote speaker, is Professor of Theology, Straker Chair of Historical Theology at Methodist Theological School in Ohio. Linda's research and recently published book, <u>Belief without Borders</u>, <u>Inside the Minds of the Spiritual but not Religious</u> (SBNR) shaped her Friday evening and Saturday morning presentations.

Linda notes that a growing number of Americans identify as "none" when asked about their religious affiliation, yet identify deeply held beliefs about God, afterlife, community and sin. She identifies these persons as "Spiritual but not Religious" because of their strong spirituality, but reluctance to identify or participate in an organized religion. Some "SBRN's" are attending our churches, but are not looking to "do church" in the usual manner.

Saturday afternoon workshops were "Called to be an Ally" (Josiah Hostetler); "When is Leaving the Church the Right Thing to Do?" (Bob Miller); "Does that Privilege Come in a Christian Flavor?" (Rosalie Rodriguez); COB History & Heroes", Jim Tuten; "Can Offering Charity Be Toxic?" (Dan Welliver); "Climate Change Conversations: A Chance to Ask Your Questions" (Sharon Yohn); "History of God" (Belle Tuten). Leadership changes due to personal needs included: Dr. Steve Schweitzer (Bethany Theological Seminary) preaching on the subject "The Book of Chronicles: Continuity and Innovation as We Seek God Faithfully"; and various Stone Church musicians substituting for Andy and Terry Murray who were to provide music leadership including a Saturday evening concert. The weekend included meaningful worship, times of connecting with old and new friends, play, rest, reflection, and lovingly prepared snacks and meals. Participants were encouraged to continue the conversation about ministry to and with SBNRs' in our congregations and communities.




New Steering Committee Members
